



#### FELC DS Engage Page: Easter 2, April 8, 2018

John 20:19-31 When it was evening on that day, the first day of the week, and the doors of the house where the disciples had met were locked for fear of the Jews, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you." After he said this, he showed them his hands and his side. Then the disciples rejoiced when they saw the Lord. Jesus said to them again, "Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you." When he had said this, he breathed on them and said to them, "Receive the Holy Spirit. If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven them; if you retain the sins of any, they are retained." But Thomas (who was called the Twin), one of the twelve, was not with them when lesus came. So the other disciples told him. "We have seen the Lord." But he said to them, "Unless I see the mark of the nails in his hands, and put my finger in the mark of the nails and my hand in his side, I will not believe." A week later his disciples were again in the house, and Thomas was with them. Although the doors were shut, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you." Then he said to Thomas, "Put your finger here and see my hands. Reach out your hand and put it in my side. Do not doubt but believe." Thomas answered him, "My Lord and my God!" Jesus said to him, "Have you believed because you have seen me? Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have come to believe." Now Jesus did many other signs in the presence of his disciples, which are not written in this book. But these are written so that you may come to believe that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God, and that through believing you may have life in his name.

<u>Sun, Apr. 8:</u> Family Project: John says that he could have written about many other things that Jesus did, but he chose these events and teachings so that people would believe that Jesus is the Son of God, and that this belief would give them life! Have everyone in the family share the story, teaching or parable that helps them in their faith. Which stories would your family be sure to put in "the Gospel according to ....?"

Mon, Apr. 9: The actions of our children or friends may deeply distress us one day, and another day simply cause us to shrug our shoulders and smile. Consequently, it seems that our peace is more dependent on internal circumstances than on external ones. When Jesus says, "Peace be with you," he is asking you to rest in his love, understanding that your value is not determined by the actions of those around you.

<u>Tues. Apr. 10</u>: What is this about forgiving and retaining sins? Jesus admonishes us over and over to forgive sins, going so far as to tell us to pray that our sins will be forgiven in the same way that we are able to forgive. More than teaching us to aspire to retain sins, this passages reminds us that whenever we retain or dwell on wrongs done against us, then we retain the corrosive effects of those sins.

Wed., Apr. 11, Acts 3:12-19 The crowd is filled with wonder and amazement as they follow Peter and John who have just healed a man lame from birth. Our passage begins as Peter outlines the life and death of Jesus, who alone deserves honor for the healing they have witnessed. We may be tempted to take ownership of the healing that God alone brings, be it emotional or physical. We can claim that our own training or our own abilities bring changes. While God certainly uses expertise, we do well to remember that only God sees inside a heart and challenges or changes a mindset. Not only does this prevent excessive pride, it also is a guard against burnout when our own efforts are not enough.

Thurs, Apr. 12, Psalm 4 According to Prof. Nancy Koester, Psalm 4 is directed in part towards those who struggle with unbelief. She writes, "Verse I says that 'God gave us room when we were in distress.' Easter means that God sets us free from the fear of death - God 'gives us room.' In the Psalms, this language means that God lifts us out of a tight spot. What could be tighter than the grave! To the unbelievers (and we all have our moments), God gives "room." Room to rise from the grave of unbelief, room for faith. "\* Don't let your doubts have final say. Bring your faith and your doubts to God. \*http://www.workingpreacher.org/preaching.aspx?commentary\_id=267

Fri, Apr. 13, 1 John 3:1-7 We read in 1 John 3 that "What we will be has not yet been revealed. What we do know is this: when |Jesus| is revealed, we will be like him." (v. 2) While we cannot know the future, we find abiding hope in two things. First the amazing, expansive love of God, a love that has adopted us and called us God's children -even when we were quite ordinary human beings. Second, we know Jesus who was willing to die on our behalf. Our future is hidden in Christ and we await his being revealed. Like a child who is assured of safety as long as they are with their parent, we can be confident that our future is secure in Christ's keeping.

Sat, Apr. 14, Luke 24:36b-48 There are several examples in scripture of times when the risen Christ meets with disciples. Prof. L.L. Hogan shows how these meetings contain encounter, explanation, eating, enlightenment and exit –and are practiced each time we come to church. "We come with our doubts, confusions, fears and misunderstandings...[E]ach week through worship we encounter the risen Christ. In the reciting of the scriptures and the preached word we are offered explanation, proclaiming the good news of what God has and is doing. We may eat with Christ, breaking the bread of the resurrection in the Eucharist...The Spirit brings enlightenment, opening our hearts and minds, setting our hearts afire. Finally, the exit should be ours for Christ has sent us out into the entire world to be witnesses to this amazing news."

Luke 24:36-48 While they were talking about this, Jesus himself stood among them and said to them, "Peace be with you." They were startled and terrified, and thought that they were seeing a ghost. He said to them, "Why are you frightened, and why do doubts arise in your hearts? Look at my hands and my feet; see that it is I myself. Touch me and see; for a ghost does not have flesh and bones as you see that I have." And when he had said this, he showed them his hands and his feet. While in their joy they were disbelieving and still wondering, he said to them, "Have you anything here to eat?" They gave him a piece of broiled fish, and he took it and ate in their presence. Then he said to them, "These are my words that I spoke to you while I was still with you -- that everything written about me in the law of Moses, the prophets, and the psalms must be fulfilled." Then he opened their minds to understand the scriptures, and he said to them, "Thus it is written, that the Messiah is to suffer and to rise from the dead on the third day, and that repentance and forgiveness of sins is to be proclaimed in his name to all nations, beginning from Jerusalem. You are witnesses of these things.

<u>Sun, Apr. 8:</u> Family Project: "Peace be with you." Jesus gives this greeting often, reminding us that his presence brings peace. This version of the song, "I've Got Peace Like a River", has the word peace floating along as though it were enjoying the Lazy River at a water park. What are the things that bring each of you peace? Mon, Apr. 9: Luke reminds us that repentance and forgiveness of sins are to be proclaimed in Jesus name to all nations. Sometimes we try to limit our proclamation, only speaking of forgiveness. We try to ignore that we are first asked to repent. While we know that God forgives, it is repentance that will grow the seeds of change. By acknowledging our own shortcomings, we are reminded of our need to rely on God whenever we encounter temptation.

Tues, Apr. 10: We read in 1 John 3:1, "See what love the Father has given us, that we should be called children of God; and that is what we are." This is a wonderful way to remember the Easter story. The love of God reaches beyond the barriers that we raise of outsiders and insiders and calls each of us one of His children. As you listen to the song, "Children of God" by Third Day, think about ways that you can share this inclusive sort of love with those whom society marginalizes. https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=V6jO7xhU\_Pw

Wed., Apr. 11, Acts 4:32-35 In our world of capitalism, the utopian society described in Acts 4 might seem more like a nightmare. If everything was held in common, how could you be sure that all members were working hard? What sort of process did they have in place to determine if someone was truly in need? Although questions abound, we cannot lightly dismiss the knowledge that the early church was a place of good news for the poor. It is not to be assumed that everyone contributed an equal amount, but that the great grace that was upon them all allowed them to give gladly, confident that they would have enough. Living in God's grace allows us to become a community of one heart and mind.

Thurs, Apr. 12, Psalm 133 Professor Nancy deClaissé-Walford writes, "The ...words of verse 1 ("how good and how pleasant") recall the...blessing uttered by a traveler or visitor upon entering the home of another in ancient Israel. The word translated "good" is tob, a word that recalls God's assessment of creation in Genesis 1. In Genesis 1 ... the creation story tells us that "God saw that it was good." In the Genesis 2 creation story, however, God declares, "It is not good (lo' tob) for the human to be alone; I will make him a helper as his partner" (2:18). The word "good" in Psalm 133:1 reminds the reader/hearer of God's provision of community and relatedness for humanity."

Fri, Apr. 13, 1 John 1:1-2:2 In the days following the resurrection, the followers of Jesus would have been trying to convince others that this Jesus who they knew, laughed with, ate meals with and listened to was actually the Son of God. However by the time that 1 John is written, there were people who accepted that Jesus was the Son of God, but no longer believed that he had been human. John emphasizes Jesus' humanity and consequently the importance of human bodily life. Rather than pursuing only spiritual transcendence, we are called to live life to the fullest, honoring our task of stewarding this world and sharing the gift of community.

Sat, Apr. 14, John 20:19-31 As Sunday morning church goers, we tend to be disparaging of "doubting Thomas." But most of us long for the assurance of seeing and touching – an advantage that the other disciples had already received. Instead, we are left to deal with uncertainty. We are among those whom Jesus himself has called blessed. "Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have come to believe." (v. 29) What is the difference between a life of faith and one of certainty? Can the "not knowing" be a blessing that compels us to rely on the Holy Spirit.
