DS Engage Page: Feb 24, 2019—Epiphany 7/ Fearless Faith

Luke 6:27-38 *"But I say to you that listen, Love your enemies, do good to those who hate you, bless those who curse you, pray for those who abuse you. If anyone strikes you on the cheek, offer the other also; and from anyone who takes away your coat do not withhold even your shirt. Give to everyone who begs from you; and if anyone takes away your goods, do not ask for them again. Do to others as you would have them do to you. "If you love those who love you, what credit is that to you? For even sinners love those who love them. If you do good to those who do good to you, what credit is that to you? For even sinners do the same. If you lend to those from whom you hope to receive, what credit is that to you? Even sinners lend to sinners, to receive as much again. But love your enemies, do good, and lend, expecting nothing in return. Your reward will be great, and you will be children of the Most High; for he is kind to the ungrateful & the wicked. Be merciful, just as your Father is merciful. "Do not judge, & you will not be judged; do not condemn, & you will not be condemned. Forgive, and you will be forgiven; give, and it will be given to you. A good measure, pressed down, shaken together, running over, will be put into your lap; for the measure you give will be*

Sun. Feb. 24: Family Project: The first time I was in an airplane that my husband was flying, he gave me a job. I was to look at a map and spot the landmarks on the ground. Having this job kept my mind off the fear of flying with a novice pilot! In our "Fearless Faith" series we have been taught to "listen to act for the good." Discuss how having a job –an action– can help us deal with other fears we have in life. (Example: focusing on encouraging a friend can help someone overcome stage fright.)

Mon. Feb. 25: Jesus calls us to a new way of living –one that does not look to the world to define "good", but looks to the example of Jesus. It brings a life that is full, rich, and fearless. When we look back to the world to define good, we fall prey to the world's worries and fears. *"The impotent double-minded one...wills the Good out of fear of earth's punishment. If the world is not really the land of perfection, then by his double-mindedness he has surrendered himself to the power of mediocrity or pledged himself to the evil."*

Tues., Feb. 26: Kierkegaard writes a beautiful conclusion to our "Fearless Faith" sermon series and study. *"Attend closely to yourself, hold firmly to willing one thing, to willing the Good in truth, and thus, from now on, let this lead you wherever for now it will lead you – because eternally it will lead you to victory. In this world let it lead you to prosperity or poverty, to honor or insult, to life or death: only do not let go this one thing. By its hand you may walk confidently even in danger. Even in danger of your life itself you may go as confidently as a child who clasps the mother's hand. Yes, even more confidently, for the child does not even know the danger."*

Wed., Feb. 27, Exodus 34:29-35 Sometimes an intense focus is actually scary. My son encountered his first music conductor when he was five. Even though she was dressed up as a cowgirl for a Halloween practice, there was no mistaking the intensity and passion in her eyes. My son certainly felt it -this person expected something from him –so he started to cry. When Moses came down the mountain after receiving the 10 Commandments, his face shown from being in the presence of the Lord. I imagine the people sensed that things were changing –something was expected of them.. May we run joyfully to God's presence, knowing that fulfilling the expectations of the law leads to a joy-filled life.

Thurs. Feb. 28, Psalm 99 Professor James Limburg writes, *"The fundamental idea behind the Hebrew word qadosh which occurs three times in this psalm...is apart or separate. A place where the Lord once appeared may be called "holy ground" (Ex. 3:5). Or a place where God is especially present may be described as a "holy temple" (Psalm 11:4; Hab. 2:20). In modern Israel to this day, a place of special significance is called a maqom qadosh or "holy place." Thus to say that God is holy is to stress the otherness or separateness of God. Isaiah saw the Lord and heard the angels singing "holy, holy, holy" (Isaiah 6:3). The 20th century theologian Karl Barth liked to speak of God as "wholly other." What a wonder that our "wholly other" God loves us enough to become human.* http://www.workingpreacher.org/preaching.aspx?commentary_id=505

Fri., Mar. 1, 2 Corinthians 3:12-4:2 Paul writes in verse 18, *"And all of us, with unveiled faces, seeing the glory of the Lord as though reflected in a mirror, are being transformed into the same image from one degree of glory to another; for this comes from the Lord, the Spirit."* We understand this passage more fully having just read that Moses only took the veil off of his face when he was in the presence of God. As we are transparent with God, willing to unveil our faces and be honest about who we are, God can transform us into her image. God knows us better than we know ourselves, and the light of God's love can change our hearts.

Sat. Mar. 2, Luke 9:28-36 At a family reunion many years ago, we were sharing stories, talking the common language that families have. We heard exploits from when cousins got together and little known memories from those of my mom's generation. Feeling the connection to one another and a larger story was so wonderful that my grade school age son exclaimed, "Mom, I wish we could stay here always." This is certainly the type of feeling experienced by Peter as he saw Jesus, Moses, & Elijah. The connection to past history must have been awesome. However, God spoke to remind them that their call was into the future and the new work that Jesus was doing. May we look to the past for inspiration, but always be set towards the future, listening to Jesus.

NS Engage Page: Feb 24, 2019—Epiphany 6/ Suffering

Luke 6:17-26 *He came down with them and stood on a level place, with a great crowd of his disciples and a great multitude of people from all Judea, Jerusalem, and the coast of Tyre and Sidon. They had come to hear him and to be healed of their diseases; and those who were troubled with unclean spirits were cured. And all in the crowd were trying to touch him, for power came out from him and healed all of them. Then he looked up at his disciples and said: "Blessed are you who are poor, for yours is the kingdom of God. "Blessed are you who are hungry now, for you will be filled. "Blessed are you who weep now, for you will laugh. "Blessed are you when people hate you, and when they exclude you, revile you, and defame you on account of the Son of Man. Rejoice in that day & leap for joy, for surely your reward is great in heaven; for that is what their ancestors did to the prophets. But woe to you who are rich, for you have received your consolation. "Woe to you who are full now, for you will be hungry. "Woe to you who are laughing now, for you will mourn & weep. "Woe to you when all speak well of you, for that is what their ancestors*

Sun. Feb. 24: Family Project: Jesus says that if you are poor, hungry, or crying, you are blessed. Talk about difficulties that you have experienced. What made them difficult? How did you get through? Have you been able to use those experiences to help others? Those who Jesus healed in body or spirit had felt his touch in a life changing way –they would never be the same. Talk about the wonder of experienced God's touch.

Mon. Feb. 25: We can never belittle another's suffering by saying that their tragedy was good. But Kierkegaard challenges the mindset that suffering is the worst thing, saying *"The busy ones that neither toil nor are oppressed but are just busy, think that they have escaped when they have contrived to avoid sufferings in this life; hence they do not wish to be disturbed either by hearing or thinking of that which is terrible. Yes, it is true that they have escaped. They have escaped having any insight into life and have escaped into meaninglessness."* Let your sufferings draw you deeply into God's embrace.

Tues., Feb. 26: Kierkegaard lifts up the possibility of choosing freedom during unavoidable suffering, *"The outward impossibility of ridding oneself of suffering does not hinder the inward possibility of being able really to emancipate oneself within suffering—of one's own free will accepting suffering, as the patient one gives his consent by willing to accept suffering. For one can be forced into the narrow prison, one can be forced into lifelong sufferings, and necessity is the tyrant; but one cannot be forced into patience...When the victim of unavoidable suffering bears it patiently...he brings a determination of freedom out of that which is determined a necessity."*

Wed, Feb. 27, Genesis 45:3-11, 15 I have asked myself many times if I would have shown the grace that Joseph did in forgiving brothers who had sold me into slavery. You can certainly tell in the way that they hold back that they are expecting the hammer to fall. They have to imagine that this brother they abused will want revenge. He would have been justified. However, by refusing to give in to revenge, Joseph makes room for restoration and for joy. He is free from carrying around anger over the actions of his brothers or regret over multiplying his father's loss.

Thurs, Feb. 28, Psalm 37:1-11, 39-40 This Epiphany we have been learning about Fearless Faith. The theme is "We listen to act for the good in front of our audience of One." Our focus is on God and doing the good. This psalm reinforces that mindset by telling us: *"Trust in the Lord, and do good"; "Take delight in the Lord," "Commit your way to the Lord."* and *"Be still before the Lord and wait patiently for him."* The people are saved, not because they have done amazing works for God, but because God has been their point of reference –their first refuge when dark times come. Like a little puppy that runs between its masters' legs when afraid, may we run first to our God whenever fear takes hold.

Fri., Mar. 1, I Cor. 15:35-38, 42-50 Many conversations about life after death begin with questions like Paul's in I Corinthians 15:35. *"How are the dead raised? With what kind of body do they come?"* We could not imagine the strength of an oak tree by looking at the acorn. We couldn't conceive of the mouth watering wonder of watermelon juice running down our chin if we've only seen the seed. And we couldn't dream up the beauty of a marigold coming from that skinny, unremarkable seed. In the same way, Paul reminds us, *"As for what you sow, you do not sow the body that is to be, but a bare seed."* (v.37) When going through struggles, we take comfort that this world is not our final home. And when caught in speculation about that heavenly world, we are reminded that we cannot even imagine the wonder of what is to come.

Sat. Mar. 2, Luke 6:27-38 We've been talking about "listening to act for the good before our audience of One." Jesus underscores how difficult that might be. Among other practicably impossible guidelines (*turning the other cheek, praying for abusers*), Jesus says, *"Do good to those who hate you."* If someone truly hated me, I likely would take a perverse pleasure in their come-uppance. I wouldn't want catastrophic bad to come their way –just a little slap to their ego that would cause a change in their attitude. Any good that would come their way, would have to be deferred until after this enlightenment. However, by asking me to do good to those who hate me, Jesus invites me to be totally free from the inner turmoil and ambiguities of their mind –free to revel in God's grace.
